

Amsale Alemu, Ph.D., is an assistant professor in the Department of African Studies at Howard University. Her research and teaching examine African political thought, decolonization, higher education and global political movements, with particular attention to the historical connections between Africa and the United States. Before joining Howard University in 2024, Alemu served as an assistant professor of history at Scripps College. She teaches courses on higher education and social change; African political thought; decolonization and the Cold War; and critical theory. She holds a Ph.D. in African and African American Studies and A.M. in History from Harvard University.

Her work has appeared in academic venues including *Radical History Review* and *Comparative Studies of South Asia, Africa and the Middle East*, and she is currently developing a book project that examines revolutionary history, higher education and U.S. geopolitics in the Horn of Africa. Alemu has received numerous fellowships and awards for her research and teaching, including a Fulbright-Hays Doctoral Dissertation Research Award and a fellowship at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard University. At Howard University, she teaches courses on contemporary Africa, social change and the historical foundations of global political movements.
