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Dixon's research focuses on afro-democracy, afro-civil society, and racialization and human rights in Latin America and the Caribbean. His research aims to frame the social experiences of Blacks in the Americas from a comparative and hemispheric perspective. He has published three books on Latin America and the Caribbean, *Comparative Perspectives on Afro-Latin America* (2012), *Afro Politics and Civil Society in Salvador da Bahia* (2016, See [short video](#) summarizing finding) and *Comparative Racial Politics in Latin America* (2019).

Most recently he served as an associate editor for the Oxford University Press '*Encyclopedia of Latin America Politics*' where he edited the section on '*Racial and Gendered Politics in Latin America* and contributed a peer reviewed article on '*Afro-Latin Social Movements*' for a different section for the volume.' His most recent articles include, *Race, Gender and Anti-Racism in Latin America and the Caribbean*, published in Latin American Research Review, '*Human Rights in Afro-Latin America*,' published in the Routledge Handbook on Afro-Latin America (2023), and '*Afro-Latin Social Movements in Latin America and Racial Inequality*' published in Oxford Handbook of Latin American Social Movements (2023). He is the recipient of two Fulbright awards and has conducted extensive field research across the Americas.
