Green's teaching and research focuses on theories of writing and linguistic justice, as well as the verbal traditions of African Americans expressed through literature, Hip Hop and Black popular culture. He has published a textbook on Black Writing Studies (BWS), *Visions and Cyphers: Explorations of Literacy Discourse and Black Writing Experiences* (2016), and he has published essays that appear in journals and collections such as *Changing English*, *College Language Association Journal*, *College English* and *The Lauryn Hill Reader*. He is a past secretary of the Conference on College Compositions and Communication and a past member of the Modern Language Association and Conference on College Compositions and Communication joint task force on AI Writing. He is currently the President of the Council of Writing Program Administrators (CWPA) and continues to serve on special tasks forces for the study of AI and Writing within the MLA and CCCC organizations. He continues to facilitate workshops, serve as a speaker, and an advocate on issues related to writing, equity, culture, and social justice.
